

Entrepreneurs from Bihar present techniques to produce petroleum products from plastic residue

LEH: A working model of a mechanized technique to produce petrol, diesel and LPG using plastic waste was demonstrated by a team of young entrepreneurs from Bihar headed by Kirti Bhushan Bharti, project mentor, Ashutosh Mangalam and Vineet Kumar on October 10 at Solid Waste Segregation Centre in Solar Colony, Choglamsar.

After learning about the functioning and the possibility of reusing and recycling of plastic waste resulting useful products besides revenue and employment generation, along with its success story of the model in other parts of the country, Gyal P Wangyal, CEC, Hill Council, Leh urged the team for a detailed presentation of their project with its requirement and a project proposal at the earliest to decide on the possibility for further collaboration

Explaining the purpose of their visit, Bharti said that the main objective is to create employment and boost local economy and they are proposing to establish a unit in Leh with the help of local government to reduce plastic waste in the region.

He further informed that the election shall be held with the use of secret ballot box and training for the same will be provided on October 17 and 21.

To ensure free, fair and transparency in the election process, Sachin Kumar said that the general observers shall be deployed to keep a close watch on every activity of the electoral process.

Day-care centre set up for the elderly in Leh

LEH: A day-care and recreation centre for senior citizens has come up in Leh which was inaugurated by Justice S. Abdul Nazeer, Judge Supreme Court of India on October 7 in presence of Gita Mittal, Chief Justice Jammu and Kashmir.

This centre, co-sponsored by Government will be a stop-shop for entertainment, medical services and legal aid for the aged people of the region. Besides, District Legal Service Authority will also provide a raft of medical facilities including geriatric care, health consultations and check-ups, physiotherapy as well as legal service to the senior citizens.

Interestingly, the centre will be equipped with computer learning and a library and the aged citizens can entertain themselves with indoor games and recreational activities.

Justice Nazeer appreciated the initiatives of the State Legal Service Authority who came up with this concept for the senior citizens.

"I feel immense pleasure in dedicating this facility to the senior citizens of this region. Opening a centre is comparatively easier than its sustainability; therefore, the local administration has a big responsibility to run this recreation centre in a meaningful way," said Justice Nazeer.

Greeting the senior citizens of Leh, Justice Mittal talked about the success story of 'Swabhiman Parisar'—a Centre for the welfare of senior citizens in Delhi which was opened on her initiative and said that similar centre was also opened in Srinagar and now in Leh with all those facilities.

Div Com Ladakh directs redesigning of subway architecture in Leh

LEH: Saugat Biswas, Divisional Commissioner Ladakh, inspected the ongoing subway construction near SNM Hospital on October 12.

Sachin Kumar, Deputy Commissioner, Leh; R.L. Angurana, Chief Engineer PWD Ladakh; Moses Kunzang, ADDC, Suresh Kumar Chib, ASP, Leh; SE PWD; Ex-En R&B, Incharge Traffic Police, Leh and concern engineers were also present at the site during the inspection.

After the scrutiny of the construction, Saugat Biswas expressed serious concern over the design of the subway. The staircase of both sides comprises about 5metres each from the existing width of the road, thereby narrowing the existing road by almost half.

With the concern for the smooth flow of traffic and everyday commuters, Biswas made a serious objection over the construction

While directing the officers he said, "It is our constant endeavour to widen roads for a smoother flow of traffic and ease of the commuters. At a time when traffic on the roads is increasing constantly and there is a need to have separate cycle tracks, nar-

rowing down of an existing road cannot be allowed."

Saugat Biswas directed Sachin Kumar and R.L. Angurana to modify the architecture of the subway and road alignment within 24 hours keeping the existing road width intact. He also

directed to restart the work only when the design ensures restoring of the original road width for easy traffic movement.

The subway is being built at a cost of ₹ 1.67 crores sanctioned under AMRUT in 2014-15 and the construction started in 2019.

EXPERT TALK

Single-use plastic

Dr. Eshey Namgyal, President, Municipal Committee Leh: Single-use plastic include items intended to be used only once before they are thrown away or recycled, such as plastic drinking bottles, food wrappers, plastics grocery bags, straws and stirrers, disposable plates and spoons, which generates more waste quantity than other plastic material.

On 150th birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi, Prime Minister Narendra Modi declared ban of single-use plastic and India will be free of single-use plastic by 2022. The dream of single-use plastic-free cannot result instantly but it's a long process which needs government as well as peoples' cooperation.

The municipal committee is the enforcing authority in this regard, we have seized certain plastic materials already and after the public notice furthermore, confiscation and fines will be charged. We are imposing fines on disposing waste anywhere, littering, unlicensed, selling of disposable products by a brand if they don't have a system to recollect the used soft-drinks bottles or mineral water. Mineral water of plastic bottle less than 200ml and other disposable items will be banned. Our plan is to discontinue the import of single-use plastic totally which eventually will erase the single-use plastic in our territory. Also, awareness and advertisement will be spread across the region.

Globally, 900 million tons of plastic are generated every year, out of which 47% of total waste comes from single-use plastic. Earlier, in Ladakh, we don't use plastic much as compared to other states and towns. We used to have a tradition that during any social function or gathering people used to carry their own cups and plates, but the time has changed now. Due to the convenient nature of disposable products people stopped practising the same old eco-friendly tradition rather end up using disposable plates and spoons. Apart from functions and gathering, the usages of disposable plastics are also there at many households. The main purveyor of single-use plastics in Ladakh is the mineral bottles which are widely used by the tourists

during the season. Over 5 lakh mineral water bottles, 11akh cold drinks and around 1.5 lakhs of oil used for lamp are sold in Ladakh.

It is believed that when a plastic bottle of water exposed to the sun for a few days, it produces dioxin and has a chemical called Bisphenol A when consumed it promotes cancer product called carcinogenesis. Likewise plastic can harm us in every method when we try to disassemble it; for instance, if we burn plastics, it releases dangerous chemical such as hydrochloric acid, Sulfur dioxide, etc and these emissions are known to cause respiratory ailments and are potentially carcinogenic.

Secondly, when the plastics buried underground, it makes the soil less fertile, plastic does not dissolve they break into pieces and it remains up to 1000 years contaminating soil waterways and ocean. We have witnessed many sea creatures dying because of plastic they gulp and which eventually affects those who consume seafood also.

Apart from that, Ozone layer, the natural shield from UVB rays from the sun, is also depleting considering plastic as one of its major cause. Burning of plastic is also the major reason for Global warming.

Initiatives

We have installed an environment-friendly 'blackhole' machine at bomb guard that works without fuel or electricity, and it converts all waste, except glass into ash.

A solid waste management plant has also installed at Shak-sha-lingu, it operates completely on renewable energy, it imbibes the principle of reduce and recycle waste.

Under Project rTsangda at rural areas, shredding machine was installed in which the plastics waste can be shredded into small pieces, 8-10% of this shredded plastics can use with coal tar during road construction which has shown much durability and intactness whereas the demand for the shredded plastics is also increasing.

During the season, we are also planning to set up water filters or water booth at various areas to refill the bottles which can decrease the purchase of packaged bottled water.

- People should carry their own biodegradable bag made of fabric.
- · People while going for shopping must cooperate with the shopkeepers when they refuse to provide plastic bags.
- While going for functions or marriages, carrying one's own cups and plates can contribute immensely towards reducing plastic



Phunsok Angmo, Watson Co-Ordinator, Ladakh Ecological Development Group (LE-**DeG**): As Prime Minister Modi has announced a ban of single-use plastics to be phased out by 2022, he specified six items of plastics which are Plastic cups, plastics straws, plastic plates, sachets, water bottle less than 200ml and polythene bags. However if the government is not

well planned with substitutes and alternate solutions, the situation will not improve, as plastic items are designed to be used only once to deliver benefits such as convenience, cost savings and public health. So, our ultimate goal is to collect these products and converted into energy or recycled.

As per the study done by Tetra Tech India Ltd in 2012, the composition of waste collected in Leh town consisted around 46% biodegradable waste and around 24% recyclable waste, although the quantity of waste has more than doubled in last 7 years, I am assuming that the percentage composition of waste must be more or the same. So, if we are doing proper segregation even at a household level by separating them based on biodegradable, non-biodegradable and hazardous waste including sanitary pads, diapers and medical waste than we can reduce 70% of waste that is being dumped in the landfill.

On October 2, we have organized a rally and an event also to create awareness among people about waste segregation and the six items of single-use plastics. Also, in collaboration with the District Legal Service Authority (DLSA) Leh, we are planning to start a door to door campaign in this matter.

Every season, almost 3 million mineral water bottles get consumed and dumped in Leh. LEDeG plans to eliminate the use of plastic mineral water bottles by tying up with MCL and local mineral water packaging companies such as Leh spring and Khayul to install water dispenser and water kiosks. Further, we are also planning on Billboards, posters and Street play to be organized in this matter.

Negative impacts of single-use plastics:

While there are various benefits from single use plastics products, problems arise when these items are not disposed of properly. Most of them are not designed to be reused whereas some cannot be recycled using the traditional method and some plastics like bio-medical waste cannot be recycled or reused.

Petroleum-based plastics are not biodegradable and when it goes into a landfill, it finds its way into the water bodies. Plastic does not decompose but breaks into tiny particles called micro plastic.

15 blocks of the district including Barsoo, Bhimbhat, Drass, Kargil, Karsha, Lotchum, Lungnak, Pashkum, Sankoo, Shakar Chiktan, Shargole, South, Tai Suru, TSG and Zanskar was done with adequate reserve staff at the polling stations for randomisation.

Officers associated with the BDC elections were exhorted by the DPEO to perform their allotted duties with dedication and sincerely to ensure the conduct of free, fair, smooth and ethical elections in the

The DPEO Kargil has also issued the schedule of training programmes for the polling personnel appointed for the BDC elections. More than 300 trainees are being trained. After the first phase, the second phase will conduct on October 14 and 17, while the final phase on October Panchayat Halqas in 15 blocks of the district will cast their votes for 22 and 23 at Auditorium Hall Kargil.



On the same day, after the withdrawal of 32 candidates out of 70 candidates from the nomination list, 38 including 24males and 14females have been finalised for the fray for the 15 seats of Block Development Council

The number of candidates left in the tussle include 4 candidates from Barsoo, 2 from Bhimbhat, 2 from Drass, 3 from Kargil, 2 from Karsha, 2 from Lotchum, 2 from Lungnak, 2 from Pashkum, 3 from Sankoo, 2 from Shakar Chiktan, 2 from Shargole, 3 from South, 2 from Tai Suru, 5 from TSG and 2 from Zanskar.

A total of 841 voters comprising of the Sarpanchs and Panchs of the election of the Chairmen to the BDCs in these blocks.

Q. Brief us about the Panchayati Raj system in Ladakh. What are the role, powers, and functions of the Block Development Council?

Panchayati Raj system in Ladakh is formed as per J&K Panchayati Raj Act 1989 and Rule 2 (1) of J&K Panchayati Raj rules, 1996. In Leh district we have 95 Panchayat Halqas.


The Jammu & Kashmir Panchayati Raj Act 1989 provides a three-tier structure with Halqa Panchayat (HP) at the grassroots, Block Development Council (BDC) at every block and the District Planning and Development Board (DPDB) at the district level. In the case of Ladakh, Hill Council acts as the District Planning and Development Board (DPDB) or Zilla Parishad- the third tier. The second tier, Block Development Council was not in existence till now. The election for the same will be held in the whole J&K for the first time on October 24.

The Block Development Council has its importance in the Panchayat system. Their function is to construct, maintain and supervise Inter-Halqa Panchayat Communication System, thus bridging the gap between every halqas and its members. It will guide Halqa Panchayats administratively and technically, and can also review their work. They will supervise plans relating to agriculture, rural development, animal husbandry/sheep husbandry, social forestry, education, and public health, cross-check eligible beneficiaries of different schemes, undertake measures for effective supervision and monitoring of various developmental programmes and many more. The Gram Panchayat Developmental plan will be consolidated at the Panchayat level to the respective block where the BDC Chairman will check and approve further at District Development Board.

Q. How important is the role of Block Development Council chairpersons?

Every Block Development Council will have a chairperson who will be elected among the Sarpanches or Panches of any Halqa Panchayat falling within the block. The chairman of the Block Development Council will have Block Development Officer as his secretary. They will also become the ex-officio members in the Hill Council and the Councillor of the respective block will be an ex-officio of the Block Development Council.

Q. Tell us about the preparation and election process of the Block Development Council to be held on October 24, 2019.



Message to the readers

I urge people of every village to take active participation and take part in all the decision-making process, thus making the Panchayat system strong and to bring development. >>

The election process of the Block Development council including preparation of electoral rolls, filing of claims and objection and the final electoral rolls was initiated in September. In Leh district, we have 16 blocks, 652 Panch and 92 Sarpanch. On September 23 we finalized the electoral roll and the total voter is 744. The Election Authority has also appointed Electoral Registration Officers (EROs) and Assistant Electoral Registration Officers (AEROs). District Panchayat Officer (DPO) of every district will be the Electoral Registration Officer while

the BDOs of every block will be Assistant Electoral Registration Officer of the concerned Block Development Council. There will be 16 polling stations.

According to the notification, the dates for the election process are as follows:

October 1 to 9: Filing of the nomination October 10: Scrutiny of the nomination

October 11: Withdrawal of the nomination

October 24: Polling (9am to 1 pm) and Counting at 3pm

Q. How many Panches and Sarpanches are eligible to vote and contest for the post of Block Development Council chairpersons? Is there any reservation?

Not everyone can cast the vote or contest in the Block Development Council election. The chairperson of the BDC is elected by the Electoral Col-

lege comprising panches and sarpanches of the panchayats falling within the block. We have a total of 744 voters including 496 male and 248 female voters. Also, reservation for SC/ST/Women and ST has been made. This time women reservation is notified in five blocks including Chuchot, Khaltse, Nimoo, Rupsho, Singay Lalok.

Q. How important it is to strengthen the Panchayati Raj system? Reason

Panchayati Raj system is a rural local self-governance which promotes democracy at the grass-root level. It is in charge of all developmental work in the villages. Various developmental plans and projects will be successful if people are taken into confidence. It will be very difficult for an officer to understand every village level need. Thus, the Panchayati raj system plays an incredible role in understanding the demands, needs, and aspirations of the villagers and also the areas to be focused on. Through different ward level meetings and gram sabhas, the voices of the people are heard.

It is very important for further strengthening of Panchayati Raj because it has the potential to empower the most marginalized sections of our society.


Q. Tell us about the relation of Hill Council and Panchayati Raj institution. Will there be any hiccups in the smooth functioning of both the bodies?

Hill Council acts as District Planning and Development Board (DPDB) or Zilla Parishad because of which there will be no issues in the functioning of both the bodies.


