#### Ladakh to host 2025 Khelo India Winter Games from January 23

**LEH:** The Union Territory of Ladakh is set to host the Khelo India Winter Games (KIWG) from January 23 to 27. This marks the second year that UT Ladakh will host a segment of these prestigious games. Previously, all events were exclusively held in Jammu and Kashmir until 2024.

The Khelo India Winter Games began in 2020, with nearly 1,000 athletes, including 306 women, participating in the inaugural edition. Since then, the event has seen increasing participation, with over 1,350 athletes in 2021 and more than 1,500 in 2022, underscoring the Games' growing popular-

The 2024 edition witnessed over 1,200 participants, including 700-plus athletes, 141 support staff, 113 technical officials, and more than 250 volunteers. A total of 136 medals were contested, according to an official from KIWG. For the first time, the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, in collaboration with the Sports Authority of India, managed the technical aspects of the Games, working alongside the National Sports Federations and the Indian Olympic Association.

"We are looking forward to another exciting season of the Khelo India Games. The Winter Games are crucial for identifying India's top athletes who can represent the nation at the 2026 Winter Olympics," said Union Sports Minister Dr. Mansukh Manda-

He further added, "Our goal is to promote winter sports and inspire more athletes to pursue skiing and skating. It is encouraging to see participants from remote Himalayan villages actively taking part in these events."

The Khelo India Winter Games aim to foster a strong winter sports ecosystem in India while offering a platform for athletes to showcase their talents on a national stage.

#### Ladakh to harness winter water resources through Automated Ice Reservoirs

LEH: Chairman/CEC, LAHDC Leh, Adv. Tashi Gyalson, convened a meeting on the launch of the Automated Ice Reservoir Artificial Ice Glacier Project in the presence of Executive Councillor Stanzin Chosphel on December 13.

The meeting was attended by Thinles Dawa, Chief Agricultural Officer; Ali Raza, Chief Horticulture Officer; and Murtaza Ali, Executive Engineer, Irrigation and Flood Control Division, to discuss an innovative solution aimed at solving the region's growing water scarcity issues.

The Automated Ice Reservoir Artificial Ice Glacier

Project is a groundbreaking initiative designed to address persistent water shortages in Ladakh, particularly during the summer months when water is insufficient for irrigation and daily consumption. This project aims to harness winter water resources, which otherwise go unused due to low seasonal

The project involves creating automated ice reservoirs that collect and store water during the winter months. Water is sourced from higher altitudes, where it is sprayed and frozen to form ice reservoirs. The system is automated, with a weather station in place to monitor temperatures.

The project will be implemented under Capex. Three sites have been identified for this initiative, with work already underway in a few villages. The project is slated to begin in Kuri soon.

CEC Tashi Gyalson remarked that the project is both innovative and highly beneficial for the region, emphasizing its potential to address Ladakh's water challenges. He further stated that LAH-DC remains fully committed to exploring and implementing forward-thinking solutions to tackle the unique environmental and infrastructural challenges faced by Ladakh.

The Advisor underscored the significance of air connectivity as a life-line for Ladakh during winters when road access is severely restricted. Discussions covered the operation of AN-32 courier services for the Kargil-Srinagar-Jammu sector, the deployment of AN-32 and IL-76 flights from Thoise and Leh to Chandigarh, and the implementation of the UDAAN Scheme at Kargil and Thoise airports.

During the meeting, he also reviewed the status of Kargil Airport and the progress of the new terminal at Leh Airport. Dr. Kotwal directed that priority be given to passenger movement, ensuring that 70% of the air cargo capacity is allocated sential cargo. To address challenges faced by residents in securing tickets, particularly during emergencies, he instructed officials to reserve a quota of seats for genuine and urgent passengers. This measure aims to assist those encountering diffi-

bookings or requiring im-

mediate travel.

Additionally, the Advisor directed the advocacy and promotion of regular services under the UDAAN Scheme using 19-seater aircraft to enhance connectivity. He emphasized the need for regular and reliable services under this scheme, which can play a pivotal role in addressing Ladakh's connectivity challenges and benefiting residents.

The Advisor also stressed the importance of implementing a transparent and efficient ticket allocation mechanism to ensure fairness and accessibility for all passengers. He urged officials to streamline operations, address logistical challenges, and

LEH: Justice Bansi Lal Bhat, Chairman of the Reservation Commission for the Actual Line of Control (ALC) in the Union Territory of Ladakh and former judge of the High Court of Jammu and Kashmir & Ladakh, submitted the final report of the one-member commission to the Lieutenant Governor of Ladakh, Brigadier (Dr) BD Mishra (Retd), on December 10 in New Delhi.

The report marks the completion of the Commission's mandate to identify areas adjoining the Actual Line of Control in UT Ladakh for reservation purposes under the J&K Reservation Act, 2004.

The primary objective of the Justice Bansi Lal Bhat-led Commission was to evaluate the feasibility of providing reservations to residents of areas adjoining the ALC

for recruitment to various posts under the Ladakh Administration. This task included ensuring administrative efficiency and maintaining minimum job recruitment standards.

Additionally, the Commission was tasked with formulating criteria for classifying any area in UT Ladakh as an "Area Adjoining the Actual Line of Control" and using these criteria to assess the inclusion of Ladakhi villages in the ALC-adjoining list.

Justice Bansi Lal Bhat briefed the Lieutenant Governor on the Commission's findings.

The Lieutenant Governor commended Justice Bansi Lal Bhat for his dedication and timely report submission, highlighting its importance for the Union Territory's governance and administrative



The World Day of War Orphans was proposed and started by the French organisation SOS Enfants en Detresses. The primary concern of this organisation is to protect children from all forms of abuse and mistreatment. It highlighted the suffering and trauma war orphans face - including displacement, malnourishment and disease.

The theme for World Day of War Orphans 2024 is centered around the concept of "Orphan Lives Matter', derived from the 'Black Lives Matter' movement in the context of racial justice in the United States. The theme asserts the need for support and protection for vulnerable individuals who have been orphaned in regional conflicts.

UNICEF estimated that there were 140 million orphans across the world by 2015. Nearly half of the people who died in the wars fought in the 18th, 19th and 20th centuries were civilians. This number grew to two-thirds in the Second World War and by the 1980s, almost 90% of the victims were civilians.

Therefore, the estimated number of orphans has increased from 1990-2001.



However, the number has declined slowly at a rate of 0.7% each year, said the UNICEF, but there is much to do in this regard, as newer conflicts are emerging with each passing year. The need to protect orphans is also becoming more dire.

Children become the silent targets of such attacks and often go unnoticed. They grow up with a life of turmoil, displacement, racial turmoil and lack of resources. In war situations, a lot of children are also subjected to sexual assaults, forced labour and human trafficking. The World Day of War Orphans becomes important in raising all the injustices and challenges they face in leading their lives.



#### In Conversation with

#### Padma Ladol, First woman Rap artist of Ladakh

## Q. Brief us about yourself. Ladakh is a small place where rap culture is new. How and when did you start writing and rapping?

I am Padma Ladol, a songwriter, composer, and rapper from Basgo village. My journey into rap began in 2018-19 when I first encountered the rap culture. I was introduced to Desi Hip-Hop, where artists expressed their thoughts, emotions, and messages through their music. This creative form of storytelling fascinated me, as it wasn't confined to having a traditionally "good" voice or perfect tune.

Intrigued, I began exploring rap further by watching performances and doing cover songs. I also started writing and memorizing published lyrics, which I later performed and shared on social media.

As I gained confidence, people around me noticed my rhythm, flow, and breath control. Their encouragement motivated me to start writing my own songs and performing them. That's how my journey as a rapper truly began.

#### Q. You often highlight social issues in your songs. How many songs have you written, and what causes have you addressed?

Honestly, I can't write about something on the spur of the moment, which I consider one of my limitations. However, I prefer focusing on themes like environmental issues, social and political concerns, and youth-related challenges, such as unemployment.

To me, rap is a revolution—activism in action. It allows us to shine a light on ongoing social injustices, giving a voice to matters that need attention and presenting them to the world through music.

So far, I've written around 18-19 songs, though I've officially published only 4-5 on YouTube. I've also shared short songs and clips on Instagram. One of my notable works is a song I wrote and performed about the tragic incident at R.J. Kar Medical College in Kolkata, where a woman was raped. In addition to full-length songs, I frequently compose and share short pieces online.

Q. Ladakh is working hard to preserve traditional and folk songs and along with it Rap or Hip-Hop culture, which is Western, has been welcomed by society. What challenges do you and other rappers in Ladakh face in spreading awareness about this culture?

It's a fulfilling path with great potential for success. 3) Rap is a non-violent medium through which social issues can be highlighted and brought to public attention, inspiring action. In Ladakh, I see the rap industry gradually evolving, with the potential to become a thriving and influential platform.

There are many talented young rappers in Ladakh, such as Lil Thun, No Chen, Deldan, Jigmet Mar-C, Tsedup, Buda-Gyatso, Togochey, and others. They possess remarkable skills in writing and composing songs that captivate audiences, often addressing social causes.

Hip-Hop is a broad cultural movement, and rap as a genre within it is gaining the attention it deserves globally. In Ladakh, it has become extremely popular among the youth, who are well aware of its potential. However, it still faces resistance from older generations, who often dismiss it as mere entertainment or a "time pass," finding it unconventional and strange.

I believe this perception will change over time as rap earns recognition and appreciation. I see a bright future for rap in Ladakh's society. I hope that social and governmental organizations will begin treating rap and the rapper community on par with other art forms. Traditional arts often have organized groups, and they perform at festivals and concerts. I hope that rap will soon be given similar platforms, acknowledging its significance and contribution to cultural expression.

#### Q. Has the government taken any initiatives to recognize rap culture and provide platforms to showcase talent?

As an individual, I've had the opportunity to perform on several occasions. One notable experience was performing on Women's Day, an event organized by the Social and Tribal Welfare Department. My performance was personally appreciated by many women officers and members of the audience, which was very encouraging.

However, there hasn't been any specific initiative from the government to support or promote the entire rapper community in Ladakh. We remain hopeful that, in the future, platforms will be created where rappers can formally showcase their talent and contribute to the cultural landscape of the region.

#### Q. How do you see the future of rap culture in Ladakh?

Rap culture is rapidly growing across the country. Reality shows like MTV's Hustle are dedicated to discovering and

After a prolonged wait, the meeting on Ladakh's 4-point agenda finally resumed. While there was limited discussion on three of the demands, some progress was made on the recruitment issue for gazetted posts. However, it would be premature to say the matter is fully resolved.

Interestingly, an issue not originally part of the 4-point agenda — 33% reservation for women in politics — was discussed by the High-Powered

Committee. As a woman, I am personally grateful for this consideration, though no permanent declaration has been made yet.

It's important to remember that the push for women's reservation is not new. During the UPA government in 2008, the Women's Reservation Bill was introduced, but it failed to pass due to a lack of opposition support. Fast forward to September 2023, the bill was finally passed under BJP's leadership, with support from the opposition. However, the unfortunate part is its delayed implementation. Despite being passed, it has been stated that it will only come into effect after five years, which is disheartening.

Women have consistently excelled in all fields, often outperforming men in academics and professions. However, their lack of representation in politics remains glaring. Without women in decision-making roles, their voices and perspectives are absent from critical governance matters.

Through your platform, I urge all political parties to ensure 33% reservation for women in the upcoming elections. This step is essential for balanced and inclusive decision-making that reflects the interests of half the population.

Women have waited long enough, and now is the time to ensure their rightful place in politics.



#### Gelek Phunchok, Member of Apex Body:

The recent discussions between Ladakh's Apex Body and the Government of India were held in a positive and cordial environment, according to our leaders. Among the four key demands, immediate attention was given to the issue of recruitment. While a permanent solution, such as establishing a Public Service Commission (PSC), will take time, some progress has been made.

Project Manager of 3R Management Limited, Kapil Kant Niranjan, provided a detailed briefing on the plant's waste management processes, including waste segregation, shredding, mixing, curing, storage, recycling, and packaging. Exploring the introduction of waste segregation at the source as a pilot proj-

The Principal Secretary Health informed about the recent advertisement for engaging specialist doctors under NHM for UT Ladakh, minimizing the requirement for specialized care.




